


## STROKES

Via palette and pattern, a palatial Georgian Revival home in Melbourne adapts to family living, while also embracing grace and elegance.







hile interior designer Greg Natale applied his masterly brushstrokes to this grand Georgian Revival home in Melbourne's southeast a decade ago, the owners invited him back in 2019 to dab more lavish layers onto its vast canvas. And this was not gilding the lily – by retouching his earlier efforts, he has made the home into, some would say, a work of art.

In such a huge home boasting seven bedrooms and nine bathrooms, not all the rooms were remodelled the first time around. And the rooms that were completed needed more warmth for a family now totalling six children and a little tweaking to even better serve their needs. "Evolution rather than a revolution," says Greg, who embraced the chance to revisit the elegant 1930s mansion.

The owners bought it in early 2013, drawn to its palatial proportions. Two huge sitting areas and separate dining, study and media rooms offered break-out spaces for a boisterous family while also giving them room to mingle. Seven upstairs bedrooms gave the family room to grow. The owners were also seduced by the solid brick construction and the manicured garden, which boasted a pergola, pool and tennis court: a recipe for easy entertaining. But the recently renovated interiors were an avalanche of white, far too chilly for family living, and conspicuously short on glamour for such a gracious home. And the humungous entry, no doubt ideal for wedding receptions, was yawning and unwelcoming as indeed was most of the house.

"The house had amazing bones, but it was bland and the rooms disjointed," says Greg. "We added intimacy by adding layers and textures." Luckily, due to those bones, the only structural »

« work needed was the removal of a wall between the main bedroom and the ensuite to create an open-plan parents' retreat.

Also in that first renovation, he stained the timber floors in the formal living (ditching off-white carpet, a no-go with children), family living area, study and dining room to create sophistication and a smooth flow throughout, adorning them with patterned rugs. Textured wall treatments included silk wallpapers in the formal areas and the main bedroom, and grasscloth in less formal areas such as the family room and media room, "There was no painted plasterboard left," he says. "These finishes create luxe layering and mood." Similarly, in the family room, he installed a wall of shelving, a fireplace and a slatted timber ceiling to create a cosseting intimacy. In the main bedroom, he installed a fireplace and reoriented the bed so it faced the extensive grounds. "It was a huge room. I played with the proportions."

This time round, the home's layout needed one more tweak—what was once a dining room adjoining the kitchen has been turned into a highly practical playroom for youngsters, while the dining has been shifted into one of two living rooms. And Greg has added more of his famous "layers". Key to that layering is the addition of ceiling mouldings to nearly every room, the architectural detailing having been stripped out by a previous owner. While he wallpapered rooms previously untouched, he rewallpapered some, too, while charcoal silk wallpapers in the living room and the main bedroom were retained.

Perhaps the most striking change is the entry, now a sitting area in its own right, which no-one could accuse of being unwelcoming. While monochrome in Greg's previous iteration, its walls now boast a striking hand-painted Porter Teleo wallpaper. And velvet burgundy Vladimir Kagan sofas, replacing a vast round white ottoman, sit under an inverted wedding-cake glass chandelier. Carpet with an ikat-inspired pattern, meanwhile, replaces chilly and formal marble tiles.

The owners wanted the new dining space oriented to the rear yard. "We created a custom dining table and introduced a rug, but re-used the existing timeless dining chairs," says Greg. By contrast, a new outdoor sitting area, or cabana, with upholstered furniture and louvres has a breezy, yet sophisticated, Saint Tropez ambience.

Perhaps the biggest change in this fascinating game of spot the difference was the palette – while last time around, it was largely monochromes, with pops of colour, Greg has given full flight to his and the owner's favourite hues: rich rubies, burgundies and maroons. "We bumped up the burgundies, which so remind me of Paris," he says – with all the warmth and allure of mulled wine. Dark ceilings in many rooms add to the embracing, cocooning effect. Kitchen benchtops, previously coolish Carrara marble, now sport darker granite. By contrast, pink – another favourite for Greg – adds softness to children's bedrooms and some bathrooms.

"The original starting point for the palette," adds the owner, was a buttoned De Padova ottoman in rich burgundy in the family room. "We just loved it and it predicated the plum and purple in the living areas." It influenced the furniture choices in another way, too. "With children, we wanted soft, rounded shapes," she says.

Greg's trademark geometrics and organic prints pervade every space. "Pattern is in my DNA," says Greg. "It's what I do, but the colour is all tonal, with nothing jumping and contrasting. While this home's maximalist, it also has clean, uncluttered lines.

"Ilove the burgundies, the warmth, the moodiness, the grandeur and the high ceilings, hard to find in a new build," he adds. "It's been great going back — you can redo things that perhaps didn't work the first time around." And the rest? They prove how well his special touch worked in the first place. 15 gregnatale.com.







